



What Christians Believe about the Trinity





Christians believe:

- There is only one God, and this one God exists as one essence in three Persons.
- The three Persons are:
 - God the Father
 - God the Son
 - God the Holy Spirit

Christians believe:

- God is one absolutely perfect divine Being in three Persons.
- His being is what God is, in relation to the universe he created.
- The three are called Persons because they relate to one another in personal ways.



When Christians talk about the Trinity, they do not mean:


- 1 God in 3 Gods
- 3 Persons in 1 Person
- 3 Persons in 3 Gods
- 1 Person in 3 Gods

Rather, they mean:

- 1 God in 3 Persons
- The Father is God—the first Person of the Trinity.
- The Son is God—the second Person of the Trinity.
- The Holy Spirit is God—the third Person of the Trinity.








The Bible teaches that there is only one God, yet all three Persons are called God.




There is only one God.

- "Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one."
 - Deuteronomy 6:4
- "Before me no god was formed, nor will there be one after me."
 – Isaiah 43:10




The Father is God.

- "Yet for us there is but one God, the Father, from whom all things came and for whom we live."
 - 1 Corinthians 8:6
- "One God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all."
 – Ephesians 4:6




The Son is God.

- "The Word [Jesus] was God." – John 1:1
- "I [Jesus] and the Father are one." – John 10:30
- Jesus' disciple Thomas addressed Jesus as "My Lord and my God." – John 20:28




The Son is God.

"But about the Son he says, 'Your throne, O God, will last for ever and ever, and e



The Son is God.


"... at the name of Jesus every knee should bow ... and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord." – Philippians 2:9–11



 Paul, the writer of Philippians, is saying about Jesus what Isaiah 45:23 says about the Lord God.

The Holy Spirit is God.

 "Peter said, 'Ananias, how is it that Satan has so filled your heart that you have lied to the Holy Spirit ... You have not lied to men but to God."" – Acts 5:3–4



- "Now the Lord is the Spirit."
 - 2 Corinthians 3:17 ("The Lord" refers to "the LORD" in Exodus 34:34.)

More than 60 Bible passages mention the three Persons together:

"As soon as Jesus was baptized, he went up out of the water. At that moment heaven was opened, and he saw the **Spirit of God** descending like a dove and lighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." – Matthew 3:16–17

More than 60 Bible passages mention the three Persons together:

 "But when the kindness and love of God our Savior appeared, he saved us, not because of righteous things we had done, but because of his mercy. He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior." – Titus 3:4–6



Misunderstandings about the Trinity

Was the Trinity Made Up?







Misunderstanding:

"The word 'Trinity' does not appear in the Bible. It is a belief made up by Christians in the 4th century."

Truth:

It's true that the word "Trinity" does not appear in the Bible, but the Trinity is nevertheless a Bible-based belief.

Example:

- The word "incarnation" does not appear in the Bible either.
- But it's used as a one-word summary of the belief that Jesus was God in the flesh.
- The word "Trinity" is used to explain the eternal relationship between the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.




Early church leaders defended the doctrine of the Trinity long before the 4th century:

 Clement (AD 96) argued for the incarnation and writes that Christ was "God in the form of a man."

 Ignatius (c. AD 90) describes Christ as "our God," and "increate" which means uncreated.

 Irenaeus (AD 177) writes, "Now the Church ... received from the apostles and their disciples its faith in one God, and the father Almighty ... and in one Christ Jesus, the Son of God, who was made flesh for our salvation, and in the Holy Spirit ..."




Irenaeus c. AD 130–200

- Justin Martyr (AD 155) makes numerous references to how Christians honor the Father, the Son, and the Spirit.
- Theophilus (AD 168) is the first person known to have used the word "Trinity."



 Tertullian (AD 197) argued for the divinity of the Son and the Holy Spirit yet maintained that "We [Christians] believe in one only God."




Tertullian c. 160–225

- Athenagoras (AD 177) describes Christians as those who acknowledge the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and "declare both Their power in union and Their distinction."
- Gregory Thaumaturgus (AD 264) calls the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit the "perfect Triad" being all eternal and equal.


Are There Three Gods?








Misunderstanding: "Christians believe there are three Gods." Truth: Christians believe in only one God.



A Trinity Symbol




- Some people might believe that Christians are polytheists—people who believe in many gods.
- This may be because Christians refer to the Father as God, the Son as God, and the Holy Spirit as God.



A Trinity Symbol

- But Christians believe in only one God.
- The Bible says there is only one God, but it also calls three distinct Persons "God."



A Trinity Symbol



Illustrations:

- Over the centuries people have tried to come up with simple explanations for the Trinity.
- There are limits to every illustration, but some are helpful.


It has been said that:

- God is not 1 + 1 + 1 = 3
- God is $1 \times 1 \times 1 = 1$



Illustrations:

- Ice, water, and steam all have the same nature, but they are still distinct from each other.
- However, the Trinity is different because the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are God at the same time.





Illustrations:

- St. Patrick of Ireland used the shamrock to illustrate the mystery of the Trinity.
- He asks, "Is this one leaf or three? If one leaf, why are there three lobes of equal size? If three leaves, why is there just one stem?"





Illustrations:

 He concludes: "If you cannot explain so simple a mystery as the shamrock, how can you hope to understand one so profound as the Holy Trinity?"





Faith

- The Trinity is a profound doctrine that must be accepted by faith.
- Accepting a doctrine by faith does not exclude reason, but it means that we cannot always apply the same logic that we use in mathematics.




Are There Three Gods?

Faith

- Without the Trinity, the Christian doctrine of salvation cannot stand.
- Some religious groups that claim to believe in the God of the Bible but reject the Trinity have an understanding of salvation that is based on good works.
- As both God and man, Jesus was the perfect sacrifice to completely atone for humanity's sin (<u>Hebrews 7:26–27</u>).













Misunderstanding: "Jesus is not God." Truth: Jesus is God, the Second Person of the Trinity.






Jesus forgave sin.


- We may forgive sins committed against us, but we cannot forgive sins committed against others.
- Jesus has the authority to forgive any sin (<u>Luke</u> <u>5:18–21</u>).





Jesus accepted worship as God.

- "Then those who were in the boat worshiped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God." – Matthew 14:33
- "Moreover, the Father judges no one, but has entrusted all judgment to the Son, that all may honor the Son just as they honor the Father. He who does not honor the Son does not honor the Father, who sent him." – John 5:22–23



Jesus claimed to be the "Son of God."

- The chief priests who wanted to crucify Jesus said to Pilate, "We have a law, and according to that law he must die, because he claimed to be the Son of God." – John 19:6–7
- They rightly understood the title "Son of God" to be a claim to equality with God.




Is Jesus a Lesser God than the Father?








Misunderstanding: "Jesus is a *lesser* God than the Father." **Truth:** Jesus is co-equal with God the Father.





John 3:16

"For God so loved the world that he gave his **one and only Son**, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."





John 3:16

Question:

Does "one and only" mean Jesus had a beginning?

Answer:

No, "one and only" means that Jesus is God's unique Son.



John 3:16

- In Hebrews 11:17, Isaac is called Abraham's "one and only" son, even though Abraham had other children (Genesis 22:2; 25:1–6).
- Jesus is God's unique Son because only Jesus is fully God and eternally the Father's Son (John 1:1–3, 14–18).



Colossians 1:15–17

"He [the Son] is the image of the invisible God, **the firstborn over all creation**. For by him all things were created; ... all things were created by him and for him. He is before all things, and in him all things hold together."



Colossians 1:15–17

Question:

If Christ is the "firstborn" over all creation, was he created?

Answer:

"Firstborn" cannot mean that Christ was created, because all of creation was made by and for Christ, and he exists before all creation.



Colossians 1:15–17

- The "firstborn" traditionally was the main heir.
- In context Paul is saying that Christ, as God's Son, is the main heir of all creation (vv. 12–14).



Proverbs 8:22–25

"The LORD brought me [Wisdom] forth as the first of his works, before his deeds of old; I was appointed from eternity, from the beginning, before the world began. When there were no oceans, I was given birth ... before the mountains were settled in place, before the hills, I was given birth."



Proverbs 8:22–25 Question: Does this mean that Christ ("Wisdom") was "created"? Answer:

This is <u>not</u> a literal description of Christ; it's a personification of wisdom.



Proverbs 8:22–25

- For example, Christ did not dwell in heaven with someone named "Prudence" (8:12).
- He did not build a house with seven pillars (9:1).
- Rather, these verses says in a poetic way that God used wisdom in creating the world.



John 14:28

"You heard me say, 'I am going away and I am coming back to you.' If you loved me, you would be glad that I am going to the Father, for **the Father is** greater than I."



John 14:28

Question:

If the Father is "greater than" Jesus, how can Jesus be God?

Answer:

In his human life on earth Jesus voluntarily shared our natural limitations in order to save us.



John 14:28

- After he rose from the dead, Jesus returned to the glory he had with the Father (John 17:4–5).
- In that restored glory, Jesus was able to send the Holy Spirit and empower his disciples to do even greater works than Jesus did while he was here in the flesh (John 14:12).



Mark 13:32

"No one knows about that day or hour, not even the angels in heaven, **nor the Son**, **but only the Father**."





Mark 13:32

Question: If Jesus is God, how could he not know when he would return?

Answer: Jesus voluntarily lowered himself to experience the limitations of human life.



Mark 13:32

- Paradoxically, while Jesus continued to be God, he chose to limit his access to knowledge (John 16:29–30).
- Paradoxes like this are exactly what we would expect if, as the Bible says, God chose to live as a real human being.



1 Corinthians 15:28

"When he has done this, then the **Son himself will be made subject** to him who put everything under him, so that God may be all in all."



1 Corinthians 15:28


Question: If Jesus is God, why will he be subject to the Father?

Answer: Jesus voluntarily submits himself to the Father's will for a time, but as the pre-existent and eternal Son, he is co-equal with God the Father (<u>Philippians 2:5–7</u>).

Are Father, Son, and Spirit Just Different Titles?







Misunderstanding:

"The *Father*, the *Son*, and the *Spirit* are just different titles for Jesus, or three different ways that God has revealed himself."

Truth:

The Bible shows that the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are distinct persons.




One God

- Some people think that the doctrine of the Trinity contradicts the truth that there is only one God.
- They argue that Jesus alone is the one true God.
- Therefore Jesus is "the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19).



One God

 While it's true that there is only one God, we must allow the Bible to define what this means.



• The Bible makes it clear that the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are distinct persons.



Three Persons

- The Father sends the Son (<u>1 John 4:14</u>)
- The Father sends the Spirit (John 14:26)



- The Son speaks, not on his own, but on behalf of the Father (<u>John 8:28</u>)
- Jesus Christ is not the Father, but the Father's Son (<u>2 John 3</u>).



Three Persons

- The Spirit speaks, not on his own, but on behalf of Jesus (John 16:13–14)
- The Father loves the Son, and the Son loves the Father (John 3:35; 14:31)
- The Father and the Son count as two witnesses (John 8:16–18)




Three Persons

- The Father and the Son glorify one another (<u>John 17:4–5</u>), and the Spirit glorifies Jesus the Son (<u>John 16:13–14</u>)
- The Son is an advocate for us with the Father (<u>1 John 2:1</u>); Jesus the Son sent the Holy Spirit, who is another advocate (John 14:26)



Misunderstandings about the Trinity

Was Jesus Fully God and Fully Man?







Misunderstanding: "Jesus wasn't really fully God and fully man." Truth: God the Son became fully human and still retained his full deity.



The Incarnation

- Throughout history many people have balked at the idea that Jesus is both fully God and fully man.
- They have tried to resolve this paradox by saying that Jesus was a mere man through whom God spoke, or that he merely appeared to be human.




The Incarnation

- The idea that in Jesus, God became a man, is difficult for us to comprehend.
- But the Incarnation is the ultimate proof that nothing is too hard for God.
- This truth is clearly taught in the Bible.



Jesus was fully human.

- As a child, he grew physically, intellectually, socially, and spiritually.
- "And the child [Jesus] grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was upon him." – Luke 2:40



Jesus at age 12 in the temple court



Jesus was fully human.

- He grew tired; he slept; he sweat; he was hungry and thirsty; he bled and died; his body was buried (Matthew 4:2; 8:24; Luke 22:44; John 4:6, 7; 19:28–42).
- After he rose from the dead, he ate and drank with people and let them see his scars and touch his body (Luke 24:39–43; John 20:27–29; Acts 10:41).



Jesus was fully God.

- Jesus commanded the forces of nature (Matthew 8:23–27; 14:22, 33),
- He forgave sins (Mark 2:1–12).





Jesus was fully God.

- He claimed to be superior to the Sabbath law (John 5:17, 18).
- He gave life to whomever he pleased (John 5:19–23).






Jesus was fully God.

- Paul said that God purchased the church with his own blood (<u>Acts 20:28</u>).
- Paul also said that the rulers of this world crucified the Lord of glory (<u>1 Corinthians 2:8</u>).
- All the fullness of God's nature and being resides in Jesus' risen body (Colossians 2:9–10).



How Early Christians Dealt with Misunderstandings







Early Christians

Christians of the first two centuries faced several threats:

 Persecution from the Roman Empire until the early AD 300s, Christianity was illegal and Christians were often viciously persecuted.



Roman coin of Emperor Nero (AD 37–68) who was known for his harsh persecution of Christians



Early Christians

Christians of the first two centuries faced several threats:

- Heresies attacked basic Christian beliefs, especially the deity of Jesus Christ and the nature of God.
- Early Christians formulated statements of belief—creeds—to clarify and safeguard what they believed.

The Apostles' Creed

- The Apostles' Creed is one of the earliest statements of faith crafted to clarify basic Christian beliefs.
- Known as the "Rule of Faith," it was developed in the AD 100s.
- It emphasizes the true humanity including the physical body—of Jesus.

The Apostles' Creed

"I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty;




The Apostles' Creed

from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen."

- The Nicene Creed was written by church leaders in AD 325, and later expanded.
- Arius was a church elder in Alexandria who claimed that Jesus was a created, inferior deity.
- Arius and his followers created much controversy in the 4th-century church.


- Emperor Constantine called for a church council in Nicaea to restore church unity.
- This creed defended the church's belief in Christ's full deity and formally rejected the teachings of Arius.

 All but two of the approximately 300 church leaders in attendance voted in favor of the Nicene Creed which clearly affirms Jesus' divinity.



Emperor Constantine with Church Fathers and the Nicene Creed


"We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven; By the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried; on the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven. He is seated at the right hand of the Father, he will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son; with the Father and the



Son he is **worshiped and glorified**; he has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come."

- Written about AD 400; says the three Persons are not three Gods, but only one.
- Named after Athanasius of Alexandria, a great defender of the Trinity.



St. Athanasius c. 296–373

"... [W]e worship one God in the Trinity and the Trinity in unity...For the Father is a distinct person; the Son is a distinct person; and the Holy Spirit is a distinct person. Still the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit have one divinity, equal glory, and co-eternal majesty. What the Father is, the Son is, and the Holy Spirit is. The Father is uncreated, the Son is **uncreated**, and the Holy Spirit is uncreated. ... The Father is eternal, the Son is eternal, and the Holy Spirit is eternal. Nevertheless,



there are not three eternal beings, but one eternal being. ... Thus the Father is God, the Son is God, and the Holy Spirit is God. But there are not three gods, but one God. ... For according to Christian truth, we must profess that each of the persons individually is God; ... The Father is made of none, neither created nor begotten. The Son is of the Father alone; not made nor created, but begotten. The Holy Spirit is of the Father and



the Son; neither made, nor created nor begotten, but proceeding. ... But the whole three persons are co-eternal, and co-equal. So that in all things, as aforesaid, the **Unity in Trinity** and the **Trinity in Unity** is to be worshipped."

- The Chalcedonian Creed was written in AD 451 to affirm the divinity and humanity of Jesus and reject the teachings of Eutyches.
- Eutyches taught that Jesus was divine, but did not have a human nature.
- The Chalcedonian Creed says that Jesus is fully God and fully man.

"... [W]e all with one accord teach men to acknowledge one and the same Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, at once complete in Godhead and complete in manhood, truly God and truly man, consisting also of a reasonable soul and body; of one substance with the Father as regards his Godhead, and at the same time of one substance with us as regards his manhood; like us in all respects, apart from sin; as regards his Godhead, begotten of the Father before the ages,

but as regards his manhood begotten, for us men and for our salvation of Mary, the Virgin, the God-bearer; one and the same Christ, Son, Lord, Only-begotten, recognized in two natures, without confusion, without change, without division, without separation; the distinction of natures being in no way annulled by the union, but rather the characteristics of each nature being preserved and coming together to form one person and subsistence, not as parted

or separated into two persons, but **one and the same Son** and Only-begotten God the Word, Lord Jesus Christ; even as the prophets from earliest times spoke of him, and our Lord Jesus Christ himself taught us, and the creed of the Fathers has handed down to us."



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Hebrews 7:26–27

"Such a high priest meets our need—one who is holy, blameless, pure, set apart from sinners, exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he does not need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for the sins of the people. He sacrificed for their sins once for all when he offered himself."

Luke 5:18–21

"Some men came carrying a paralytic on a mat and tried to take him into the house to lay him before Jesus. ... When Jesus saw their faith, he said, 'Friend, your sins are forgiven.' The Pharisees and the teachers of the law began thinking to themselves, 'Who is this fellow who speaks blasphemy? Who can forgive sins but God alone?"

Philippians 2:5–7

"Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, with God something to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness."

John 17:4–5

"I have brought you glory on earth by completing the work you gave me to do. And now, Father, glorify me in your presence with the glory I had with you before the world began."



John 14:12

"I tell you the truth, anyone who has faith in me will do what I have been doing. He will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father."





John 16:29-30

"Then Jesus' disciples said, 'Now you are speaking clearly and without figures of speech. Now we can see that you know all things and that you do not even need to have anyone ask you questions. This makes us believe that you came from God."

Matthew 28:19

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."
